Avni Amin, *WHO/UNFPA*. Understanding and Applying a Public Health Approach to Preventing and Responding to Gender-Based Violence



Avni Amin is a technical officer at the department of reproductive health and research at WHO's Department of Reproductive Health and Research. Avni has nearly 25 years of experience working on gender, sexual and reproductive health and HIV issues and for the last 15 years has been working on violence against women as a public health problem. At WHO, Avni has led the development of the Global Plan of Action on Health Systems Response to Violence Against Women that was endorsed by 193 countries at the World Health Assembly. She has also led the development of clinical guidelines for responding to child and adolescent sexual abuse. Avni has a PhD in international health from the Johns Hopkins University, School of Hygiene and Public Health and is originally from India.

Achille Bapolisi, *Mbarara University of science and technology Catholic University of Bukavu, Catholic University of Leuven.* The Most Vulnerable Among the Vulnerable: Women in Refugee Camps



I am a Congolese Medical Doctor, trained in psychiatry, who did his training in Uganda, taking care of refugees from different African countries in Nakivale Camp. My choice of doing psychiatry was motivated by a personal propensity in psychology and neuroscience, but mostly by the urgent need of mental health professional in post-conflict areas.

I am currently doing a fellowship in Belgium at 'Cliniques Universitaires Saint-Luc' in Adult Psychiatry. I did a master of psychopharmacology at Neuroscience Education Institute. I am also participating in the Harvard Global Mental health Program: Trauma and Recovery.

I am planning to work on a local and adapted program of mental health, mobilizing communities' resources, integrating mental health in primary care services and connecting with local and global networks.

Gry Tina Tinde is gender and diversity coordinator at IFRC since 2016. She chairs an IFRC Task Force on Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse and oversees the development of an IFRC PSEA policy. In 2018 she supports 15 Red Cross and Red Crescent National Societies in developing and adopting their own PSEA policies, and will support 15 more in 2019 and 2020 in doing the same.

She has served in two UN peacekeeping operations and her background covers protection from sexual and gender-based violence, Code of Conduct issues, refugee women's livelihoods and fundraising, as well as election monitoring, social media campaigning, training, grant management, university lecturing and being UNHCR spokesperson. She was Diversity Advisor at the Inter-American Development Bank and Special Advisor on Gender Issues to the UN High Commissioner for Refugees. Her passion includes advancing the rights of ethnic minorities, people with disabilities and the LGBTIQ community.
